Visit to CERN

Year 12 Physicists enjoyed a threeday visit to Geneva for a once-in-alifetime trip to CERN to learn about the fundamental particles which existed during the Big Bang this half term. Seeing at first hand the data centres which collect petabytes (1 petabyte = 1 million gigabytes) of data, while walking around the Compact Muon Solenoid, one of the four enormous particle detectors, transformed it all from science fiction to reality for the group. Students also learnt more about the ongoing research at CERN, met professors and saw models of the huge magnets used to deflect particles around the Large Hadron Collider. The group (pictured left with Jack Petchey himself) had qualified for the final by winning through borough and regional finals of the competition as champion.

Fifteen young speakers appeared before judges including the 2016 competition winner Ajaye McDonald, actress Una Stubbs, *Times Educational Supplement* editor Ann Mroz, English Speaking Board CEO Tina Renshaw, 2016 Carnegie Medal winner Sarah Crossan and BBC Radio 4 *Today* programme editor Sarah Sands. Despite a strong performance, James did not triumph on the evening.

News in brief



Year 8 students Navya Aggarwal and Debora Antanistipan (above with fellow DWHS entrants) beat off competition from 78 other students to win first position at the **West London Gifted and Talented Science & Technology Challenge Day** at West Thames College on 11th July. They will now go forward to compete in the Regional Final in December.

Year 9 student Samiya Hossain (top, centre) has won the **Perivale Woods Key Stage 3 Poster Competition**. Her entry was praised by judges for being eye-catching and informative. She won an Outdoor Classroom Day, which involved learning about the importance of woodlands and sampling techniques. Samiya said: "I am very proud to have won. The reward trip was really fun as we all got to venture out and look at all the different species in the woodland".

Members of Invictus, winners of the 2016–17 **house competition**, were presented with their trophy at the start of July. They attended a Rock Assembly at Wembley as their prize.

Year 7, 8 and 9 students demonstrated a strong work ethic and battled hot weather to collect an astounding 13 bin bags of **litter** in an hour (top, right) on a visit to Spike's Bridge Park on Tuesday 4th July.

Students have responded to the **Grenfell Tower** fire tragedy by raising money to support those affected by the event and writing messages of support. Money



has been raised by participation in the nationwide 'Go Green for Grenfell' day and selling cakes and samosas.

On Wednesday 5th July Year 7 students competed in a **Spelling Bee**, in which four teams of the best spellers from sets 1–10 went head to head in a number of spelling and word challenges to win the title of 'Spelling Queen Bee'. The event was charismatically hosted by Mohd Khan and Sejad Parwez, and there was lots of active participation and engagement from the audience. The winners (below) were: Jasmeen Multani, Tonica Whint and Karina Yon.



Year 8 Resistant Materials students have been creating moveable **wooden toy robots**. Each robot has its own personality and students have grown in confidence using the workshop tools and machines, whilst developing a range of technical drawing skills.

Year 12 Geographers conducted two days of **urban fieldwork** in July as part of their Independent Investigation. They travelled to East Acton and Stratford to compare an area that had not seen ma-



jor redevelopment with one that had. They collected data using both traditional techniques, such as questionnaires and shopping surveys, along with more cutting-edge methods such as using photos to study imaging, psychogeography and the use of apps, including one to monitor noise levels.

Year 9 students have been rising to a **fashion challenge**, designing and making a piece of clothing using only bin bags, cardboard and other recycled materials in four hours or less. Some very creative responses were produced, with students employing a variety of techniques to create different textures, patterns and build the structure of their piece.

The **Year 11 Prom** (below) was held at the Riverside venue in Hounslow at the end of June. Entertainment was provided by a DJ, a caricaturist and a magic mirror photo booth. Awards were given in categories including the sportiest and most determined in the year group, as well as for the male and female with the best hair.



The **lunchtime house quiz** on 30 June ended in a four-way tie for first place, with Fortius, Invictus, Laurus and Magnus sharing the spoils. All houses did very well in the maths round.

Twenty-five Year 9 students enjoyed a trip to JBSki for a day of **water sports** (left) at the end of June. The day saw them trying a number of activities including water skiing, knee boarding, volleyball and a banana boat ride.
