Student Spotlight



The Globe Trip

"Last Wednesday, we had the opportunity to explore the Globe Theatre, the famous theatre where Shakespeare's plays were once performed. There were 4 perspectives which you could watch the plays from. The first being the floor area which in that time could hold to around 1000 people and were known as the "groundlings". Next, was a seating area near the stage but on the bottom row, if you had a bit more money than the "groundlings" you would often be seated there. Then, where we were seated, it was a bit higher up, so it was better to see the action take place. Lastly, we had the place behind and above the stage which had the best sound and showcased wealth and authority, this would usually be for the monarchy or anyone rich who wanted to emphasise their status. The whole Globe theatre could fit to around 5000 people meaning it must have been very crowed. The stage was very decorative with paintings of the sun, stars and zodiacs to depict an image of heaven on the ceiling. We could see cracks around the stage and a thatched roof covered in moss, highlighting the theatre's rich history. It is truly a stunning theatre filled with culture that everyone should visit.

After our tour, we went to the lecture hall, where we examined multiple past performances of 'Hamlet' created at the Globe. There were several interpretations, including a unique production featuring a female Hamlet. Each performance was distinct, making them fascinating to watch. A favourite performance was Act 3, Scene 2 from 'Hamlet,' which was visually aesthetic due to the clever use of shadows and lighting that added a sense of mystery to the scene.

Our final activity was an engaging acting session, led by our tour guide who taught us how to perform using iambic pentameter. We were given different scenes from 'Hamlet' and encouraged to change our movement with the end of each line. It was an energetic exercise that everyone found enjoyable. The guide also helped us include passion into our performances by emphasising key words and varying our delivery. This acting experience immersed us in the world of Shakespeare, deepening our understanding and appreciation of his plays. It was a perceptive experience that we all cherished and learned from."
