HEATHROW WORKSHOP

Dormers Wells High School had the privilege of hosting members from SPARK and volunteers from Heathrow Airport, who facilitated an exciting Heathrow STEM Generation session for Year 8 students. Student Spotlight—Amin Nabizada



We spoke with **Amin Nabizada**, Watford FC Football Player and Ex Student, about life after Dormers Wells High School.

How have you been since leaving DWHS?

It's been a good transition, and I've settled in well at Watford. Moving from school to a professional football environment was a big step, but I was prepared for the challenge. The support system at the club has been great, and I've really enjoyed pushing myself to improve every day.

How did you get started in your football career?

I was always playing football, whether it was at school, in the park, or just kicking a ball around at home. I trained with my brother's team, which helped me develop my skills and understand the game better from an early age. Playing with older players made me stronger, more competitive, and more determined to keep improving. Those early years gave me the foundation I needed to take football seriously.

What motivated you to pursue football professionally?

I love the game. It's something I've been passionate about for as long as I can remember. My older brother was a huge inspiration—seeing him train and take football seriously pushed me to do the same. I also wanted to make a name for myself, to prove that I could make it at a high level. Beyond that, I knew I didn't want to go down the wrong path in life. Football gave me a purpose, discipline, and something positive to focus on.

What has been your greatest achievement so far?

Making my Championship debut against Leeds United, who were top of the table at the time. It was a special moment because it was something I had worked towards for so long. Playing in front of a big crowd, against a top team, and proving that I belonged at that level was an incredible experience. It made all the hard work and sacrifices feel worth it.

What has been your greatest challenge so far?

Getting injured during my first England call-up was a really tough moment. Representing your country is one of the biggest honours in football, and to have that opportunity taken away because of an injury was frustrating. It was a test of my mindset—I had to stay positive, focus on my recovery, and use it as motivation to come back stronger. Setbacks happen in football, but it's about how you respond to them.

What are your ambitions for the future?

I want to play at the highest level possible. That means continuing to work hard, keep improving, and take every opportunity that comes my way. Whether that's playing in the Premier League, representing my country again, or testing myself against the best players in the world, my goal is to keep pushing myself and see how far I can go in the game.

Any advice for our current students?

For those feeling confused about their future—don't stress too much. Everyone's journey is different, and sometimes you don't figure things out straight away. Keep trying new things, work hard, and trust that things will fall into place. School is about learning, growing, and discovering what you love. Try different activities, meet new people, and focus on becoming the best version of yourself. Whatever you do, give it your all, and remember that effort and attitude will take you far in life.
